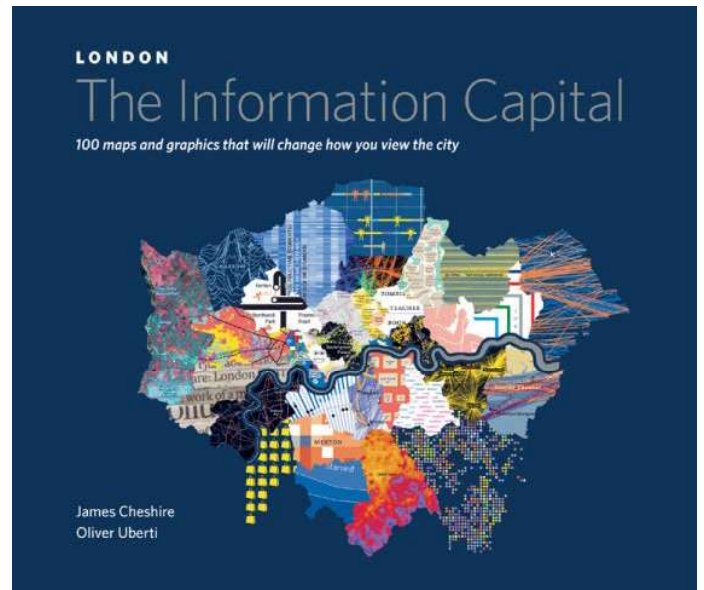
ABOUT JAMES CHESHIRE



Dr James Cheshire is a Senior Lecturer at the University College London, Department of Geography and Deputy Director of both the ESRC's Consumer Data Research Centre and the UCL Q-Step Centre. He is co-author two critically acclaimed books - *London: The Information Capital* and *Where the Animals Go*.

In 2017 James was the recipient of the Royal Geographical Society's Cuthbert Peek award 'for advancing geographical knowledge through the use of mappable Big Data' and in 2018 he won the NACIS Corlis Benefideo Award for Imaginative Cartography with co-author Oliver Uberti.

His research interests span the use of large spatially referenced datasets in the social sciences and he has published in a range of journals on a variety of topics including the use of cycle hire schemes, the spatial analysis of surnames and new ways to visualise population data.



In 2015 James won The British Cartographic Society Award, the John C. Bartholomew Award for Thematic Mapping and The Stanfords Award for Printed Mapping with 'London: The Information Capital'
